From the Rabbi's Study

Compassion in Action



At the beginning of Parashat Vayera in the Book of Genesis, we read about God's encounter with Abraham. The text reads:

"God appeared to him by the terebinth trees in Mamre; he was sitting at the entrance of the tent as the day grew hot."

This is the only time when God appears to a human character without saying anything. All God does is show up. It is unclear from the Torah itself why God decided to just show up to see Abraham. Our sages teach us that Abraham is recovering from his circumcision and God is visiting him in his convalescence. In other words, God is doing the mitzvah of *bikkur holim* – "visiting the sick."

It is unclear why God doesn't say anything. Could it be that God – like us – is at a loss for words? After all, it is often times uncomfortable to visit someone who is ill. They don't feel

well. They are often not looking their best. Sometimes conversation is physically difficult for them. Also, it is hard to think of what to talk about with someone whom you know is suffering.

God's presence in this scene is not because God can't think of something to say. Rather, it is to teach all of us that we don't need to have something to say. Our physical presence is the point of the visit. To do the mitzvah of *bikkur holim*, literally, all we need to do is show our face.

We are blessed at our Congregation to have an amazing Chesed Committee that visits people in the hospital. Also, Jewish Family Services has a team of trained Spiritual Care volunteers who visit community members at hospitals throughout the Kansas City area. If you would like to have a significant impact on people's lives, I encourage you to email me at dglickman@bethshalomkc.org.

Also, if you have a friend or a family member who is ill, please know that

you can contact the synagogue and let us know who is in the hospital. We try our best to visit people in the hospital, and we also can include their name in our misheberach list. The misheberach is a prayer that we say during the Torah service asking for God to heal the soul as well as the body. In both our Shabbat service and our weekday Torah readings, we include a reading of these names. Unlike many decades ago, we do not get lists of patients directly from hospitals, so we are reliant on the consideration of our members to call us.

As we leave Thanksgiving and look toward Hanukkah and the secular new year, it is easy to get lost in our own celebrations. For families that have members struggling with illness, this can be a time of loneliness and isolation. That extra phone call, card or visit can go a very long way.

Tired of Politics? Turn it Off and Turn on to Shul

I don't know about you, but I find that there's too much politics in the air right now. Sure, we need to be good citizens. To do so we should try to understand what politicians are doing and make our own opinions known. But much of what passes for news these days isn't really useful to us; it just reinforces what we already think. So here's a suggestion: find some time every week to turn off the news and turn on to what Beth Shalom has to offer our members of all ages.

Our strategic plan commits Beth Shalom to provide three different ways for our members to participate in the life of the Congregation: (1) prayer and spirituality; (2) learning; and (3) engagement in communities.

You can join fellow members in prayer twice a day, every day of the

year. On weekdays, the daily minyan takes place every morning and evening at Village Shalom. Since those who are saying Kaddish can only do so if ten of us are present, your participation is an important mitzvah. Or come to Shul on Shabbat. The Rabbi and Hazzan are in the process of rolling out a participatory Friday evening Kabbalat Shabbat service, which you'll hear more about. Or turn off the news and enjoy Shabbat morning, at services led by the Rabbi, the Hazzan, and many of your fellow members.

Want to learn with and from others? The Rabbi teaches a Talmud Jam at noon twice most months, in different locations. Check the website for dates. The Rabbi and Hazzan teach the Peltzman classes most Thursday mornings. Even though those classes are sponsored by Sisterhood, men are welcome, too.

Want to be part of the Beth Shalom community in other ways? On Saturday evening, December 16, come to the Geshen Hanukkah program and dinner. Whether you have children in your family, or just like being around children, you should enjoy this evening. Or, consider attending "Breaking Bread", the annual fundraiser, on Sunday evening, January 21. Enjoy a delicious, kosher dinner, prepared by the chefs at Rye KC, with fellow congregants and others. It should be a memorable evening. Or look for one of the Pop-Up Rabbi sessions at various locations in town; come share a warm drink with the Rabbi and others.

There's a lot going on in the Beth Shalom community. And when you come out of Shul, the news will still be there- you won't miss a thing.

- Bake cookies for Firefighters: Bake cookies and deliver to your local fire station. You might even be lucky to sneak in a tour while you are there.
- Bundle up and go for a walk: We all still need fresh air and Vitamin D from the sun. Go for a walk and play I Spy or turn it into a Scavenger Hunt.
- Dance Party: Turn on some music and get moving to the beat.

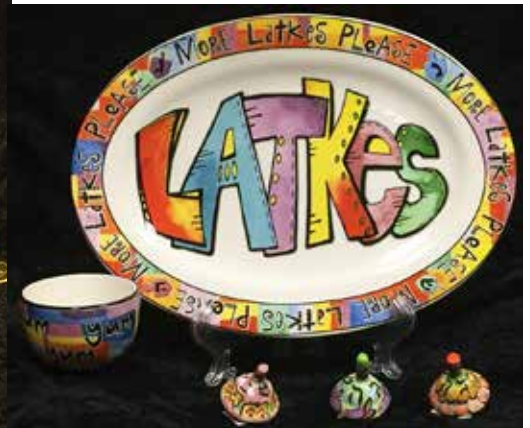
Before we know it, Spring will be here and our children will be back at the parks and riding bikes. Until then, enjoy these ideas and treasure the time spent with your child.

Sisterhood Celebrates it's 94th Birthday

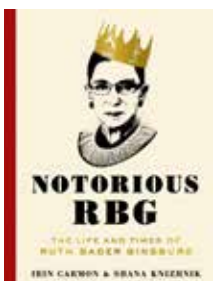

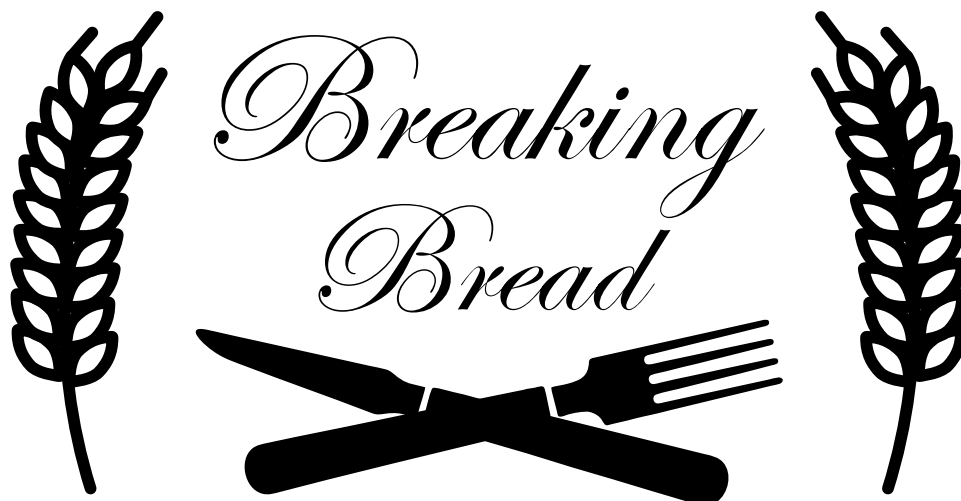
