Giving the Perfect Graduation, Engagement or Wedding Gift

As spring begins to ease into summer, there are many joyful life stages to celebrate: high school and college graduations, engagements, and weddings. Finding that perfect gift can be so difficult. I have a suggestion for one that can be used by anyone celebrating these life stages: genetic testing.

I know that this seems like a very strange gift to give, but Jewish people have a much higher chance of being a carrier for genes that can cause genetic disorders. There are many myths surrounding Jewish genetic testing that are no longer accurate. Many people think that if someone is of Sephardic origin, they have no concern for genetic disorders. Others think that if a young person is adopted, the product of an interfaith marriage, or a Jew by choice (a convert to Judaism), or are in a same-sex relationship, then they do not need to think about Jewish genetic disorders. Also, many Jews have heard of Tay-Sachs but not the myriad of other conditions that can now be tested for.

These myths are not true. First of all, many of the genes that cause genetic disorders in the Jewish population are also present in the general population (perhaps just not as prevalently). Also, the Sephardic community also has histories of certain genetic disorders. Finally, many LGBT couples choose to use a sperm or egg donor, so it's important to get screened. 80% of babies born with a genetic disease are born to parents with no known family history and the only way of knowing your carrier status is to get screened or to have an affected child.

For all individuals, getting genetic testing allows young people to have more knowledge and information about themselves. Even in the extremely rare situation where both parents are carriers of a disorder, it is now possible to get pregnant through in vitro fertilization with pre-implantation genetic diagnosis. The technology exists to actually test fertilized eggs and choose to implant healthy embryos.

Though there are many testing services that are gaining popularity for ancestry and curiosity (23andMe, ancestry.com, etc.)

I do not recommend any of these services. I do recommend JScreen.org.

JScreen is a service housed at Emory University and is funded by multiple Jewish and Disease foundations. They have the easiest, most accurate, most affordable, and most convenient method for genetic testing. It is literally as easy as clicking on a website, spitting in a tube, and putting a box in the mail. JScreen tests for over 200 disorders and costs only \$149 regardless of the health insurance of the person getting tested (this test would normally cost many hundreds of dollars more.)

Also, because of a unique fund begun by the Cortés and Price families, discounted testing is available for the Kansas City community. To register using the \$49 coupon code, follow these steps:

- 1) Visit JScreen.org to register for your test kit.
- 2) Select "Kansas City" from the "how did you hear about us" dropdown.
- 3) Enter your insurance information on step 2.
- 4) On step 4, enter coupon code "RPC2018" and click "apply".
- 5) Your kit will be mailed to the address provided on your registration.

You must be 18-45 years old and live in the Kansas City metropolitan area to use this coupon.

I strongly request all the couples to whom I provide premarital counseling to get screened through JScreen. However, families can be proactive and encourage their high school and college graduates, new fiancées, and newlyweds to get tested.

Author and motivational speaker Dr. Leo Buscaglia, said, "Your talent is God's gift to you. What you do with it is your gift back to God."

I've always believed the difference in talent possessed by the best and worst players in the NBA is minuscule. The difference is the amount of practice, preparation, and commitment displayed by the individuals.

Talent gives us unique abilities; it doesn't give us fame, fortune, or recognition. Abilities are of little value without giving the time and effort to enhance the skills our talent allows us to have.

Wynton Marsalis, one of the greatest musicians and composers of our lifetime was recognized as a musical prodigy well before his 10th birthday. Wynton once told an interviewer he practiced 6 to 8 hours every day to reach his goal of being the best trumpet player in the world. Not every prodigy will make that commitment; not every prodigy can or will become a Wynton Marsalis.

Few of us will ever become a professional athlete or entertainment icon. But we all possess talents that give us the ability to do important things in the world around us. We may never patent the next great invention. We may never have the scientific ability to find a cure for cancer or some other devastating disease. But, we may have the ability to help prevent someone from hurting themselves physically or emotionally. We may have the ability to write books, build houses, fly a plane, or to simply make people laugh.

People may have a talent for painting, knitting, decorating, cooking, or playing golf. But, this does not mean we all have the same level of talent in those areas. Whether we use our talents to excel as a professional, hobbyist, teacher, or weekend warrior, we have a responsibility to not waste it. We all should strive to be the best we can possibly be at whatever we are doing.

Let God know we thank Him for the wonderful gift He gave us when we came into this world. Let Him see that we work hard to use the skills we have because of it to be a better person, a better family member, a better citizen of the world. Let this be our gift back to God.

But let's be honest- the time when school ends for one year and begins for another is over 12 weeks. There will be plenty of down time when you will be looking for some things to do around the KC area. We have compiled a list from N-Z of places to go and activities to do that are either FREE or will not cost much. Make some memories this summer- our children won't be young forever.

Nerf gun or nerf ball wars. This can be done inside or outside and part of the play is counting how many nerf pieces you start with and having the same number collected when you end.

Oak Park Mall- ride a carousel, play at the Lego store, imagine at the Disney Store, play in the indoor play areas. Perhaps visit the food court for a dessert at the end of your visit.
