## Purim: The Time to Come Together

In the Book of Esther that we read on the evening and morning of Purim, we read the words:

Consequently, these days are recalled and observed in every generation: by every family, every province, and every city. And these days of Purim shall never cease among the Jews, and the memory of them shall never perish among their descendants.

This verse that proclaims that “the memory of [these days of Purim] shall never perish among their descendants” gives a unique, eternal quality to the holiday of Purim. This descriptor does not apply to any other holiday during the Jewish calendar year. Maimonides [1135-1204] in his great corpus of Jewish Law, the Mishneh Torah, teaches that this verse hints at the fact that while all of the other books of scripture may lose their relevance in the Messianic Era, the Book of Esther will remain.

What is so special about the Book of Esther and the holiday of Purim that it will remain in the Messianic era? One understanding is that we will need to remember the holiday of Purim in the Messianic Era precisely because the events of the Book of Esther can only happen at a time that is not a time of redemption.

Esther is fundamentally about how the actions of human beings bring about Divine redemption. It is the only holiday whose story is tied completely to the diaspora. It is the only holiday where the miracles are inspired by human activity. Also, it is a holiday that celebrates redemption from the near destruction of all of world Jewry. In this way, the miracle of Purim affects us all. It is a great unifying holiday.

*We think of Purim as a “little kids” holiday, but it is truly for all ages – and an opportunity to bring more Jewish unity into the world.*

This year, we are blessed to have our neighbors from the Temple, Congregation B’nai Jehudah join us for our Purim celebrations. They are undergoing construction on their building, and this gives us a unique opportunity to come together to celebrate an all-ages Purim celebration. Rabbi Nemitoff was kind in reaching out to us to collaborate, and though he will be on Sabbatical during Purim, Rabbi Smiley from Temple as well as many of their staff and community will be joining us for Purim.

Purim is a holiday based on reaching out to our neighbors through the mitzvot of having parties, giving tzedakah to the poor, and giving gifts of food to our friends. I hope that you will join me in welcoming our friends from Temple and celebrating into the night on Wednesday.

Of course, the primary mitzvah on Purim is to hear the Megillah (which will happen at 7:30 pm). But, I want to encourage ALL ADULTS (childcare is not provided) to come out and celebrate the miracle of Purim with our friends from Temple and with live music from a great local band, the M80’s. Be happy, it’s Adar!

## From the Board

### “See one, do one, teach one...”

The psychology notion of “nature vs. nurture” has always interested me. About behavior, are humans pre-wired through genetics or does the environment have the primary influence? While the color of eyes, consistency of hair, even height is scientifically influenced by our biologic parents, empirically how we perform seems significantly determined by our surroundings.

We tend to examine data and take time to reflect, to identify opportunity and influence outcome. For example, when planning a project and implementing steps, results are studied to understand improvement for the next time. It is this active sharing from repeated trials that helps others learn from our stumbles.

However, there is another component to learning, a more passive piece. There is benefitting to showing someone how to do something rather than just telling someone to do it. **“See one, do one, teach one” concepts integrate this type of role modeling, I observed in medical school, noting the best way to exhibit understanding is to demonstrate application of knowledge.**

We need to consider these ideas in Judaism. Learning clearly does occur through watching and listening to others. Attending community services at Beth Shalom helps us learn to chant Hebrew. Observing others wear tallit or place tefillin teaches how it is done and, for those that never have before, makes it less “foreign” the first time.

But, role modeling is the how that integrates “nature and nurture” and “passive and active” learning to encompass all these ideas. Engagement of parents and family members of religious school students in worship on the bimah for aliyot, and chanting Torah and Haftorah teaches our children the importance of our collective Jewish community engagement. It reinforces ongoing structured religious participation within our family units and displays the importance of life long participation prior to and post bar/bat mitzvah age.

We should all strive to continue to participate in programming. On Shabbat, though we learn lessons often from philosophic interpretation of Torah content, I personally feel that attendance (i.e. physically “showing up”) on Shabbat morning makes it better for all of us. It is this tangible demonstration that helps us all enhance our own complex networks, examining history and concentrating on learning together to build a full and joyous future for generations to come.





## Life Lesson 18: "It's always hard to deal with injuries mentally, but I like to think about it as a new beginning. I can't change what happened, so the focus needs to go toward healing and coming back stronger than before."

As you probably know, I am living this quote by two-time Olympic Gold Medalist Carli Lloyd. My surgeon tells me I did a really good job on my knee. I don't think he meant it as a compliment.

I have written often about not giving up, not quitting. I believe the time it takes to accept the results or consequences of our actions or actions against us and work on the healing process is directly proportional to our attitude. I can't relive the evening of January 23; it is in the past. I can't reverse the damage that was done. But, rather than dwell on that fateful night, I am determined to spend all my energy on healing. It is only through acceptance and determination that I will come back soon to wander the halls of Beth Shalom.

Few of us will avoid "...the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune", the injuries, illness, and other misfortunes life throws at us. Don't allow depression to overtake your thought process. We may be down at times, but we are not out. We may grieve, but we will heal.

Keep a positive attitude. Keep moving forward. Keep healing. Keep believing. A good team of doctors, nurses, therapists, and family are there for us, but all of them together are only as powerful as we allow them to be. It is our attitude that will make us strong.

With God's help, our support groups can put us on the path to recovery. But to get to the finish line, we must want to be healed. We must think positively. We must have the right attitude. We must want to come back stronger than before.

## What is Jewish Music?

When I was in Cantorial School, I took a class where my professor, Dr. Marsha Bryan Edelman, challenged us to answer the question, what is Jewish music? We struggled with the idea of whether Jewish music is music written by Jews, or for Jews, or whether it must have a Jewish theme somehow, or whether it must be played in a Jewish setting... Must it be prayer-or biblically-related? Must there be some combination of the above? Is there one aspect of the writing or content or performance or intention of the music without which the music is rendered specifically not Jewish?

Until recently, I thought this question was rather esoteric. I can answer the question of what is Jewish music for myself - after all, I know it when I hear it. But this question takes on a new relevance to me now because on March 10, I am hosting a concert of Jewish Music for our community.

The concert will feature four Hazzanim, four cantors - myself, and my friends, Asa Fradkin, Elizabeth Shamash and Steven StoeHR. The performers are Jewish. We will be singing to a (mostly) Jewish audience. We will be singing in a Jewish setting. Nearly every piece we will sing was written by Jewish composers. You will hear songs in English, Hebrew and Yiddish, songs from Broadway, from the Yiddish theater, and from American cinema. You'll even hear music inspired by the Abuyadaya, the Jews of Uganda!

I don't know whether this concert will answer the question, "what is Jewish music," but I hope this concert encourages you to think about the question!

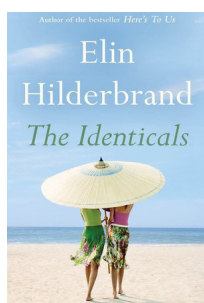
