Jewish Family Services Older Adult Services: Our Communal Partner in “*mipnei seivah takum.*”

In Parashat Kedoshim, also known as “The Holiness Code” in the Book of Leviticus, we have the following mitzvah:

You shall rise before the aged and show deference to the old; you shall fear your God: I am the Lord (Leviticus 19:32). In Hebrew, this phrase begins “*mipnei seivah takum.*”

This *mitzvah* of rising before the aged is linked by the Torah intrinsically to the fear of God. Essentially, this verse is teaching us that the reverence and respect we are commanded to give to our elders is similar to the mitzvot of honoring our parents, our teachers and our rabbis. In the first Aramaic translation of the Torah, the commentator Onkelos translates this verse as the following: *You shall rise before the ones who know Torah, and you will make beautiful the face of the elder.*

This translation indicates that the elder in our community is, by definition, a Torah scholar. One might think that being a scholar comes only from book-based knowledge. However, the Sefer HaChinuch writes: “the young sage has seen with his wisdom that which the aged have seen with many years.”

The Jewish community of Greater Kansas City is particularly blessed with the sacred work of Jewish Family Services of Greater Kansas City. The Older Adult Services at JFS provide so many tools for the elderly in our community to live with dignity.

JFS has Help@Home, which helps bring affordable light repair work to the home of seniors. Additionally, they have JET Express Transportation which is a transportation service to help elderly get from one appointment to another, visit synagogue, go grocery shopping, etc. Both of these services allow the elderly in our community to retain their dignity and their independence by helping with these critical areas.

If you have an aging friend or family member in the Jewish community, I strongly encourage you to reach out to JFS to connect them. With mitzvot like “rise before the aged,” we have the opportunity to not only stand before the elderly when they enter the room—but help them live with dignity, with independence and help contribute to our community through these services.

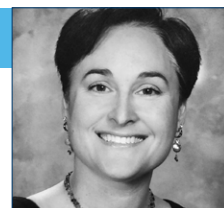

A Gabbai with Grace

When you come to shul on Shabbat morning or a holiday, you hopefully feel that the service runs smoothly. One of the reasons it runs so smoothly is because of one person who helps Rabbi Glickman and me, the Gabbai.

During my tenure as your Hazzan, that position has been ably filled by Larry Kalendar, *zichrono livracha*, may his memory be for a blessing. The Gabbai is one of a cadre of men and women who put in countless hours of volunteer time to make sure all goes well during services. The volunteers to read Torah, those who organize the Torah readers, who organize and who volunteer to serve as gabbai'im for the Torah reading, and our lay service leaders—I am grateful to all of these men and women.

As I sit down to write this article, however, I am stunned at the untimely passing of my friend. Larry met me before services started each Shabbat and holiday to go over whether there were any special aspects to that day's service, or whether Rabbi

or I had any special requests as to who should get honors that day. He was warm and welcoming to guests, always trying to include newcomers in our service. His was the unenviable job of inviting all men, including teens, to put on a kippah, or figure out whether the unknown person who just put on a tallit was actually Jewish, and if not, helping them to understand in the kindest way possible that they should ~not~ be wearing a tallit.

Larry knew from my simple glance when something was amiss, and usually could figure out what the problem was without my having to say a word. He was subtle, and always tried to fly under the radar, which is impressive, considering his stature, and which made him the consummate Gabbai. From the unasked-for but needed bottle of water to juggling honors for the most complicated of Bar and Bat Mitzvah services and holidays, Larry was a Gabbai with grace. His sense of humor often made me smile even when I was trying to be serious, but his support of Rabbi Glickman and me on the bimah was unwavering. I will miss him.





Life Lesson 19: *Fried's Law, "If necessity is the mother of invention, then survival is the father of creativity".*

Some of the world's greatest ideas and inventions have come as a result of someone recognizing a need or problem, discovering an answer to the problem, and finding a way to monetize it. The solution may have come by sheer accident, but you may find a way to utilize a failed response to another problem to solve a dilemma you did not realize had a viable solution.

There are times in our lives we feel the world is crashing in on us; times we may feel the world is against us. We may feel we are unable to handle the emotional stress. The physical strain can be devastating. We may feel life has dealt us a bad hand, when life may have actually dealt us an incredible opportunity.

In 1968, 3M scientist Arthur Fry accidentally developed a light sticky adhesive that his company saw no commercial application for. It was patented and filed away to be ignored forever. Six years later, fellow scientist Spencer Silver was looking for a way to hold bookmarks in his hymnal while singing in his church choir. That "accident" was called the Post-it Note, a little piece of paper that is sold in over 100 countries and has created an industry that generates annual revenue in excess of \$2 billion.

And then there was a boy who was told by his teachers he was too stupid to learn anything. He was fired from his first two jobs for being unproductive. He persevered and found the solution to many of life's problems. He could have easily decided it was too much to take on. He failed time and again. That man grew up to be one of the world's most prolific inventors, Thomas Edison. He said, *"The most certain way to succeed is always to try just one more time"*. He failed over 1,000 times before successfully inventing the light bulb.

We don't have to be another Fry, Silver, or Edison to make a difference. We all have the capability to create. We all have the capacity to think of new ways of doing things. We all have the ability to recognize that someone else's failure may be the answer to our dream and possibly make this world a better place.

We all have the power to ignore the naysayers and rise up to create the next light bulb or the next Post-it Note. We all have the power to survive.

Do you remember your first time? *I do.*

I was at Beth Shalom at 94th and Wornall, late in the day. I was wearing black biking shorts and a long t-shirt after exercising. It was already dark outside and I was just standing around at about 6 PM. Someone came around the corner and down the hall. I was waiting for my kids at the end of a Hebrew school session. And then it happened.

I was asked to be the 10th person to make a minyan... Me. A woman. In my 30s (at the time). Married. With three children. In gym clothes.

Come to services, make a minyan, visit the sick, enjoy food, listen to prayers and music, take new classes, reflect on yourself, engage in programming, try something different (whether it's your first time or your hundredth time).

Asked to fill a crucial spot to help someone say Kaddish, by participating in the chapel service.

Which I did.

I think back to that evening with fondness as I recall that was the first time I remember understanding my place as a member of Beth Shalom.

As a mom, I remember being worried that my kids would not find me in the foyer waiting to pick them up and that they would be upset, not realizing I was just in the next room in services.

Of course, they were fine.

And, I remember how proud I was when I told them why I was late.

"I made a minyan. Me."

That simple invitation changed me. That "ask" helped me realize the impact I alone could have with my Jewish community, so crucial to my core beliefs (which I hadn't fully realized prior to that individual proposal).

I still get teary-eyed reminiscing about the first time.

Consider yourself personally invited by me.



19 Free and Fun Things to do with your Preschooler this Summer

Since the year is 2019, I'm going to give you a list of 19 free and fun activities to do with your preschoolers this summer. There will be no need to spend any money or drive anywhere.

1. **Letter Scavenger Hunt** Name a letter (or use colors) and see how many things your child can find that begins with that letter.
2. **Make homemade playdough** (recipes online) and provide cookie cutters, plastic cutlery, toothpicks, etc.
3. **Read a book together** and have your child draw his favorite part of the book or have him add a page to the book with his drawing.
4. **Play board games** *together*.
5. **Make phone calls** to family members such as a grandparent, aunt, uncle, etc. Let your child dial their phone number and give them conversation starters.
6. **Bake and decorate sugar cookies** *together*. Save some for your family and share some with others (*i.e. neighbors, fire department, friends, etc*)
7. **Have a lemonade sale**.
8. Turn out the lights, bring out the sleeping bags and popcorn, and **watch a movie**.
9. **Make frozen watercolors** and let your child paint the driveway/sidewalk. *Ex: using ice cube trays and popsicle sticks - you can use regular ice cubes or add washable liquid watercolors.*
10. **Have a carwash**: give your child a bucket, some sponges, and some liquid dish soap, hand him a hose and let him have at it. He can also wash his toy cars, ride on toys, etc.
11. Give your child a water gun or a water squirter and ask them to **draw a picture outside** with it.
12. **Have an indoor picnic** (or outdoors if weather isn't too hot) *together*.
13. **Play hide and seek with an object**. *Ex: hide a ball and give your child clues to find it.*
14. **Have a good old bubble party**. Provide your child with bubbles and a variety of bubble blowers.
15. Give your child puppets (homemade or store bought) and take turns putting on **puppet shows**.
16. **Collage Art** Provide your child with various art materials and let them create a masterpiece.
17. **Make a fort** and have a camp out with flashlights... tell stories, make shadow puppets, eat a snack, read a book, etc.
18. **Architect Time** Provide your child with a variety of building toys - legos, blocks, bristle blocks, magna tiles, etc. - and have your child create a structure.
19. **Make a necklace/bracelet/keychain** using colored pasta noodles and dental floss.

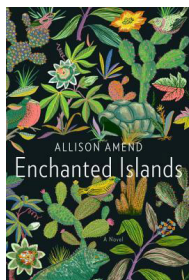
It's Time to Renew Rabbi's Employment Contract
