From the Rabbi's Study

Rereading Genesis



As we wind down from the High Holidays, Sukkot and Simchat Torah we begin the rereading of the Torah. Each Shabbat morning, we will start our story again. In October, we will start with “In the beginning...” and by next fall, we will be at Moses’ final breath.

This year, I want to invite us all to reread the Book of Bereshit (Genesis) anew.

These stories are so familiar to many of us from our days of childhood, that we may have not read them in many years with fresh eyes.

As an adult, we can read about the heroism and the flaws of each of our protagonists. I suggest trying to keep up with the Weekly Parasha as much as you can, and reading a little bit each week.

I think that the stories may appear at once more baffling and also more disturbing than you might remember them. I encourage you to sit in the discomfort and the inspiration.

Revisit the relationship between Abraham, Sarah and Hagar.

Explore again the complexity of Rebecca’s machinations surrounding the birthright of Jacob/Esav.

Dive into the emotional depth of betrayal and reconciliation, and separation coupled with reunification that we see in the extended narrative of Joseph and his brothers.

Though the stories may seem familiar on first blush, if you choose to scratch beneath the surface, you will see fully three-dimensional characters who struggle with similar challenges as us. These characters struggle with making good choices when there is

nobody there to guide them. The characters live in their greater society of government, commerce and war – but also focus on passing on their family values.

One of the “hidden gems” of our congregation is the monthly Torah study group that meets before Shabbat. Svetlana Sorkin leads a study session with a dedicated group of learners. Newcomers are always welcome. This is a wonderful way to not only grow spiritually, but to connect with others in our synagogue community. These discussions will be richer if your voice is added to the mix.

Sarah Peltzman Adult Education Classes

The Sarah Peltzman Adult Education Classes for 2017-18 will begin on Thursday, November 2, from 10:00-11:30 am in Goldsmith Hall. The offerings for the classes will come from Project Zug. The cost is \$36.00 for each participant (or \$46.00 per couple) for each course. Participants have the option of downloading the course materials from projectzug.org, or paying an extra \$5.00 to purchase the materials copied and collated by volunteers. Our teachers will be Rabbi David Glickman and Hazzan Tahl Ben-Yehuda. The classes are open to the community. Payment to register may be sent to Suzanne Lange, Education Vice-President, 3020 West

27th Street, Lawrence, Kansas 66047. Checks should be made out to Beth Shalom Sisterhood.

The course for the first session, which will run from November 2 to January 18, will be Judaism: Identity, Pluralism and Peoplehood. The course for the second session, which will run from February 1 to May 11, will be The Prayerbook: New Interpretative Methods. Students wishing to study more in depth will be able to go online to projectzug.org for more information. Judaism: Identity, Pluralism and Peoplehood will discuss whether Judaism is primarily an ethnic or religious identity. Students will discuss how to work with Jews with whom we dis-

agree and how to preserve their ideological integrity while understanding the perspectives of others. Participants will also investigate the boundaries and definitions of Jewish peoplehood and how to maintain the delicate balance between their responsibilities to themselves and to other Jews.

The Prayerbook: New Interpretative Methods will examine the many prayers composed over the years that comprise our prayerbook. Students will learn what the prayers actually mean and learn to relate to them in a more personal way. Participants will look at the prayerbook differently and investigate the Shabbat and weekday prayers to achieve deeper meaning.




It is so important to lay the foundation now. Remember, your little person is growing up so quickly! It won't be long before that little person grows into a big person you will be so proud of!!


