Judaism's Invisible Holiday

Unlike the secular calendar, instead of one extra day on a leap year, in the

Jewish calendar we get an entire extra month. To ensure that Passover falls at the correct time, we add the extra month of Adar. However, surprisingly, the “extra” Adar is the first Adar and not the second. Purim falls in Adar II, and if you have a loved one's yartzheit, it is observed in the second Adar as well.

There is, however, a nearly invisible holiday in the first Adar. It is called “Purim Katan”. Literally, the “mini-Purim.” No, we don't bake smaller hamentashen, read 1/3 of the Megillah, and only give a little bit to the poor because it is “mini” Purim. In fact - we do none of this!

The Mishnah teaches us in the tractate of Megillah that the two holidays are identical in every way except for reading the Megillah, giving Mishloach Manot (gifts of food), and gifts to the poor. In other words, Purim Katan is exactly like the real Purim - except for all the rituals that we do on Purim!

Without all the rituals, what is left? Purim Katan, the mini Purim, is what I would call “the essential” Purim. It forces us to dig deep inside ourselves and find the joy without the crutch of drinking a lot, having a costume party, reading the Megillah, and giving and receiving gifts.

In an article by the Lubavitcher Rebbe (translated by Kansas City's own R. Sholom Wineberg), we see a teaching that juxtaposes our need for a constant fear or reverence for God, with the obligation to worship God in joy and to constantly be in a state of Joy.

The conclusion of the essay teaches:

“Only after he has completed his service [to God] is one's joy fully revealed in its full force, permeating every fiber of his being.”

I believe that the gift of Purim Katan is a gift of presence of mind and intentionality. We have the same mitzvot that day as every other “regular” day of the year - giving tzedakah, praying to God, educating our children, honoring our parents. But on the day of Purim Katan, we have a special opportunity to fulfill these mitzvot with the joy of Purim.

What does Purim celebrate, after all? It celebrates the freedom to live freely as Jews. That freedom is not just for special holidays, but for the everyday living that we are blessed with. Purim Katan teaches us to have more than presence in the everyday, more than even gratitude in the everyday - but to push ourselves to live one normal day as if it were a giant celebration.



Dear Friends,

My earliest memories of Beth Shalom date back to the building at 34th and Paseo and the nursery school at 95th and Wornall. Thinking back to those early years evoke powerful and nostalgic feelings of love, warmth and security. It has saddened me in recent years, especially since the attack at the community campus, that we no longer are able to take this sense of security for granted. I appreciate all that Bernie Fried, Rabbi Glickman and others have done to make our facility at 143rd and Lamar safe. And I appreciate that they have revisited our security in the wake of the horrendous shooting in Pittsburgh.

After consulting security experts, new plans for security enhancements include improved external lighting, lockdown capabilities and digital cameras capable of identifying anyone casing our facility. We as members already have invested considerable sums in making Beth Shalom more secure, and the need for this latest round of measures, at a cost of \$50,000, is unfortunate but necessary.

Whether your earliest memories of Beth Shalom are of the building on Paseo or the current facility at Lamar, please consider helping with this initiative. Alan and I have made a personal commitment toward the latest enhancements, as have other family members and the Sosland Foundation. Won't you please consider joining us? 

Jewish Medical Ethics


