Counting the Omer: Counting our Days

From the night of the Second Seder until the beginning of the festival of Shavuot, there is a mitzvah to count the omer. An “omer” is a measurement of grain, and the Biblical and agricultural roots of this mitzvah are found in the counting of the days and the weeks of the annual barley harvest. We count for a total of 49 days – seven weeks.

As with many of our celebrations whose Biblical roots are agricultural, there are other layers of meaning that the ritual acquires throughout the ages. From the earliest rabbinic sources, Shavuot is recognized as the celebration of the day when God gave the Jewish people the Torah. So, the counting of the omer gains an additional resonance: marking the sacred time between redemption from Egypt to God’s revelation at Sinai.

In the decades after the destruction of the Temple, the time period came to contain a period of quasi-mourning because of the calamity that befell Rabbi Akiba’s students. This is why we refrain from Jewish weddings and other public celebrations until the 33rd day of this counting (The festival of Lag B’Omer).

This year, though, I learned a profound teaching from Rabbi Jill Hammer’s book, *The Jewish Book of Days*, which we read each morning in our daily minyan at Village Shalom. She quotes a teaching from the midrashic work *Genesis Rabbah*. In this passage, the rabbis debate whether the world was created during the Hebrew month of Nisan or the Hebrew month of Tishrei. This midrash writes, “The one who says that the

world was created in Nisan holds that Abel lived from Passover to Shavuot.”

Though I had learned about the ancient rabbinic debate as to whether the world was created in Nisan or Tishrei, I had never before learned about how this could correspond to the length of Abel’s days.

Rabbi Hammer writes in her book that the midrash “imagines Abel has a mythically short life; Like a frail blossom, he is born, grows up, and dies in the course of seven weeks.”

The contrast is incredible. If we understand the Omer counting from the perspective of the giving of the Torah, we see this seven-week time as going from slavery to standing in the presence of God receiving the most vital wisdom in history directly from the Divine. If we understand the Omer counting from the perspective of Abel’s life, we see the seven-week time as an entire life on fast forward. From one of the first two humans born of a mother, to being the first victim of murder – killed by one’s own brother.

To understand this fragile time period is to recognize that all of our lives hang in a balance. We can look forward to God’s revelation, or we can see our whole life be lost. Rabbi Hammer concludes her essay with the words, “We look at Abel and learn to number our days.”

The Torah’s mitzvot – such as counting the Omer – are not simply to turn us into automatons, but rather to give us the most human awareness that our days are limited and we must choose how to create meaning in each one.

Life Lesson 8: You've Got a Friend

Talk show icon, Jack Paar, once told the story of reading that a person is lucky to have two true friends in his life. He dismissed that hypothesis because he had “millions of friends”. Some time later, Paar found himself in the hospital. Besides family, he was visited by one person. He said he was still looking for his second friend.

We tend to use the term friend loosely. “There is nothing on this earth to be prized more than true friendship” (Thomas Aquinas). Acquaintances are people you like seeing, but with whom you may not share your innermost thoughts. Relationships with Facebook friends are usually superficial, at best. Good friends are people you trust, but may only be there in the good times. They will listen to you, but may not offer honest advice. They will tell you what you want to hear.

True friends are there for you through the good times and bad. They won't tell you what you want to hear; they will tell you what you have to hear. When everyone else is walking away, they will be the ones coming to you. They will always be there for you, whether you want them there or not. They are a rare breed. They are your true friends. As French poet Jean de La Fontaine said, “Rare as is true love,

true friendship is rarer.”

It is said that true friends are hard to find, harder to leave, and impossible to forget. According to British clergyman and author Thomas Fuller, “If you have one true friend, you have more than your share”. Some of us may go through life without ever finding that one true friend. Until we do, we will never understand the joy they can bring into our lives.

You can't advertise for a true friend. No one can apply for the job. Searching for one is useless. However, that true friend is out there. Maybe you are one of the fortunate ones whose true friend has found you. If not, maybe you two will soon meet. As author Mandy Hale wrote, “Two things you will never have to chase: true love and true friends”. They will find you.

Quoting that old Jewish proverb, “Who finds a faithful friend, finds a treasure”.

Spring Installation Luncheon

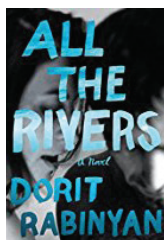
