While watching the film *Defiance*, Gitla was moved to tears. "I was very happy to see, at last, a monument to my brother," Gitla said.

## Reading Genesis as an Adult

The problem with most Jewish education is that it is wasted on the young. Of course, most of us would not be involved with our spiritual lives as adults if we didn't have powerful experiences as children. However, many of us drift from Jewish living because we only know it as children.

It would be impossible to work in finance with a seventh-grade level of math. It would be challenging to understand today's global politics with a seventh-grade understanding of social studies. Our enjoyment of literature would be severely limited if we never left the young adult section of the book store.

Similarly, if we only learn the Book of Genesis from the perspective of how we learned it as elementary children, we are limiting our own appreciation. On Simchat Torah, we began the reading of the Torah anew – and while the words are the same, we are different.

Here are the steps that I suggest for a new encounter with these ancient stories. (Though the links are not present in the print version of The Scroll, you can find any of these resources with some quick googling – or email me at [dglickman@bethshalomkc.org](mailto:dglickman@bethshalomkc.org)).

- 1) Find a translation to read the weekly Torah portion. The *Etz Hayim* that we have in synagogue uses the JPS translation of the Tanakh (the Hebrew Bible). This is available for free on [sefaria.org](http://sefaria.org), or hard copy can be purchased from Amazon.com.

If you are looking for a contemporary translation that captures the essence of the Hebrew, look at Everett Fox's translation of The Five Books of Moses. Chabad produced a translation based on Rashi's called "Chumash: The Gutnick Edition."

- 2) Set aside a time each week to read it. For our over-scheduled lives, finding dedicated time to read the weekly Torah portion is often the hardest part. I suggest before work over a cup of coffee, before bedtime during the week, or setting a 15-20-minute daily meditation break for reading.
- 3) Find a "grown-up" commentary. Our Torah was not meant to be read just on its own, but through the lens of interpretation. That is not to say that you must accept every interpretation that you read. However, in the same way that it is possible to get much more out of an art museum when accompanied by an art historian – it is possible to get more out of the Torah when accompanied by a teacher. I like the commentaries on the website of the Hadar Institute. I love the writing also of Robert Alter and Aviva Gottlieb Zornberg.
- 4) Open your heart to be challenged. This is the other tough part – allowing the text to pierce your soul.

Reading the weekly Torah portion allows us to live within a different calendar. It allows us to see our own life events living in tandem with the lives of our patriarchs and matriarchs. It is not unusual to see parallels or conflicts. But regardless – it is to live with conversation.

### Performing a Mitzvah

Did you see our synagogue's beautiful sukkah this year? Every class participated fully in the decoration of our sukkah. The youngest students made shiny pieces of starry sky, so we could see stars even when the sun is out. The entire school made a cornucopia brimming with fruits to celebrate the fall harvest, and everyone in the school was invited to add their wishes for the coming year on the banner. Students hung colorful paper chains, papier-mâché pomegranates, cards with new year wishes and beautiful 3-D butterflies to beautify our sukkah.

What is the point of all this decorating? Isn't it enough just to go into the sukkah and say the blessings, eat a meal and leave? Isn't it enough just to do a mitzvah?

When we do a mitzvah, it's good. But when we do a mitzvah in a beautiful way, that's *biddur mitzvah* – beautifying a mitzvah – and that's something we strive for when we can.

Think about when you light Shabbat candles; the mitzvah is just to light candles. But how many of us just take two candles, plop them into some tin foil and light them? I would venture to guess that most of us have a set of beautiful candlesticks, whether we chose them ourselves or whether they were a gift to us from a loved one or our synagogue, or whether we light a set of candlesticks lovingly passed down from generation to generation – these candlesticks are a *biddur mitzvah*, a beautiful layer that personalizes the mitzvah, that makes the mitzvah dearer to us.

One wish I have for the coming year for myself and for all of us – that we should each choose one mitzvah and go one step further with it. To make a *biddur mitzvah*, to beautify it, and in so doing, to personalize it and make it closer to our hearts. May you have a beautiful year, and may you bring beauty into the world this year!

you are the BIGGEST influence in your child's life.*

### Peltzman Classes

As you may have noticed during the past few weeks, there have been new and exciting changes taking place around Congregation Beth Shalom. There has been an important arrival, but it isn't space, nails, or carpets.

**The Sarah Peltzman Educational Series has arrived.** For years the "Peltzman Classes" have provided education for adult learning. For the past year, Rabbi Glickman and members of the Sisterhood have created a new learning format for Adult Education at Beth Shalom. The new Peltzman experience will meet on selected Thursday mornings from 10:00-11:30 am.

Instead of reading books or articles and then coming to class for discussion and group learning, the new Educational Series provides us with short (four weeks) educational units. 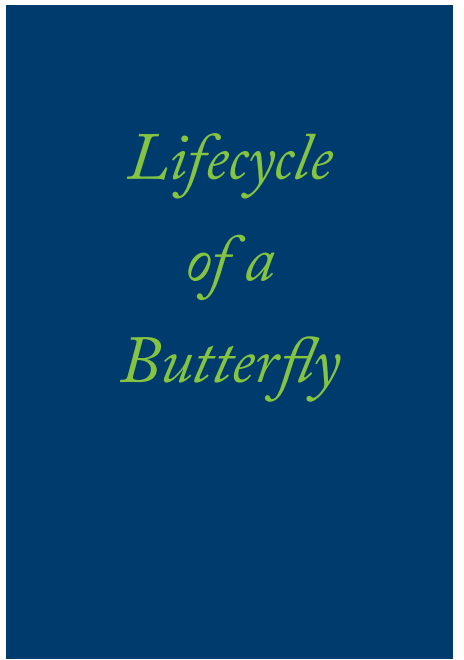

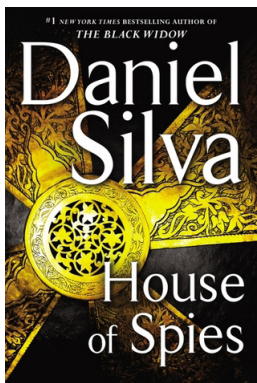

## Fit to a 'T'

The Thursday, October 25 program, "Fit to a T," will be facilitated by Dr. Kim Templeton, 1-2 pm in the MAC Room of the Jewish Community Campus. The program is designed for both men and women focusing on fracture prevention and osteoporosis. Participants will learn about the prevention, early detection, diagnosis, and treatment of osteoporosis. The "T" in the title represents a T-score, the measure of a person's bone density and susceptibility to fracture. Weak bones can affect individuals of all ages. Knowing what a T-score is and what "bone health" means are important first steps.

Dr. Templeton is Professor of Orthopedic Surgery at the University of Kansas Health System in Kansas City. She is past president of the U.S. Bone and Joint Initiative. Dr. Templeton will share her expertise on common bone and joint problems, to improve prevention and early treatment.
