To help us train for the High Holidays this year, we have an incredible Elul Institute with teachers from diverse backgrounds and institutions. In our High Holiday prayers each year we say that Teshuvah (repentance), Tefillah (prayer), and Tzedakah (charity) push aside the severity of God's decree.

## Life Lesson 24: *“When you forgive, you in no way change the past – but you sure do change the future.” – Bernard Meltzer, former radio talk show host*

On the High Holidays, we ask God to forgive us for our transgressions against Him. We ask God to enter our names in the Book of Life as we atone for our sins. But God cannot forgive us for any harm, whether physical or mental, we may have inadvertently or intentionally committed against another person. Only that person can forgive us. And, if that person will not forgive our transgressions against them, we have the ability to ask three times in front of witnesses before we are absolved in God's view.

In turn, we must forgive others whom we believe have caused physical or mental harm to us. None of us can change the past; none of us can predict the future. But all of us must let go of the anger and frustration we feel towards others in the present, whether they be family, friend, or stranger.

Mahatma Gandhi was right when he said, “I will not let anyone walk through my mind with their dirty feet.” Do not allow another person to live inside your head. No matter how angry, upset, or frustrated you may be, let it go. The ability to forgive does not mean you must forget. It does mean you have the strength to forgive and move on with your life. As Gandhi also said decades ago, “The weak can never forgive. Forgiveness is the attribute of the strong.”

Holding onto anger against another person can only cause pain and suffering. You may not feel you deserved the offense. Maybe you misinterpreted what was said; maybe

you misunderstood the deeper meaning. Were you right or wrong to feel that way? Does it really matter? Forgive that person, and that person may in turn forgive you. After all, he or she may believe you were the cause of any problem between you two. And, even if they do not want to forgive, be the stronger person.

*Be strong, laugh and enjoy life. Forgive and move on. Face God with a clear conscience. Pray for His forgiveness knowing you have forgiven those whom you believe have transgressed against you and you have been forgiven by those whom you may have caused harm to.*

An old Chinese Proverb says, “Holding onto anger is giving someone else free rent in your head.” I don't know about you, but I don't have room for anyone else living in my head. I barely have room for all the clutter I've collected up there over the years.

## “What’s up with the Imahot?” (part three of three)

A Rabbi arrived in his new community and set about learning the customs of that place. He asked a group of congregants – do you sit for the Shema, or do you recite Shema standing? Some said, “we sit.” Others said, “we stand.” “Sit” the first group grumbled. “Stand” responded the second group. “SIT” they shouted. “STAND” was the response. The Rabbi looked to the president who shrugged his shoulders and said, “this is our tradition – we argue!”

At Beth Shalom, there are those who wish to include the Imahot in the Avot section of the Amidah, and there are those who wish not to. When davening silently, I do not mention them, since I prefer most often to stick to traditional texts. I do not include the Imahot not because they are unimportant, but rather because the prayers as written reflect the ancient relationships, hopes and mythology of our ancestors, and they speak to the history of our liturgy. For me, they are historical and meditative as well as prayerful.

Because of my upbringing, because my father was so expressive in how he valued my mother’s partnership with him, because he was so supportive of my desire to be a community leader, because of the way he trained and supported girls and women in our community to become leaders in every way, I believed that women “count” as much as men in Judaism. Because he and my mother taught about the importance of all the wives and daughters to the development of early Israelite and later Jewish life, I never felt left out. I had no ax to grind, if you will.

In his thoughtful and thorough responsa on this issue, Rabbi Shai Held, citing Maimonides, Rashi, Rabbis Karo and Isserlis of the Shulchan Aruch, as well as several other sages, comes to the conclusion that it is permissible to include the Imahot in the opening of the Avot of the Amidah, but not in the closing of the brachah (please email me if you want a

copy of the full text of the responsa). He finds that there is support and there are precedents for changing the wording of a prayer, particularly when the purpose is to heap more praise on God. If there is communal need/outcry to include these words, all the more so.

**Mentioning God’s relationships with Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah brings to memory all the good that God brought to these women, and to all of Israel through them. And when the community asks for this addition, then it is good and right to add it. Rabbi Held holds, however, that we should not add “ufoked Sarah” or “ezrat Sarah” at the end of the Avot. The Avot originally ends with Abraham only, excluding Isaac and Jacob, calling out the utterly unique relationship that God and Abraham have. Why, Rabbi Held asks, should we include Sarah where Isaac and Jacob have been excluded? In Rabbi Held’s words, “while the Imahot and their merits are critical to us, Abraham remains Abraham, and ...he should stand alone.”**

As the shlichat tzibbur, prayer-leader, of a community where there are men and women who strongly desire that we include the Imahot, it is incumbent on me to include them. And so when I pray out loud in a minyan where I know most people want and need to hear the names of our foremothers, I include them, and I will continue to do so. When the book from which I daven gives me the choice to include them in the opening prayer and not the end, as our Machzor (High Holiday prayer book) does, that is the choice I make based on Rabbi Held’s responsa.
